other words! My Early Childhood knowledge tells me it is just the beginning of making sounds and my Mumma’s heart tells me she knows exactly what she is saying. Thank you to everyone who has loved on her, she is certainly the best dressed baby in Rwanda and I haven’t bought her a thing - she is still receiving parcels in the post filled with clothes for her, and just sometimes when the post takes three months to get here and she has grown out them we have the blessing of passing them on to other Mums who are so very grateful.
